The course presents core concepts in syntax (constituency, movement, functional elements, embedding, hierarchies), compositional semantics (predication, connectives, quantification, movement at logical form) and formal pragmatics (conversational implicature, presupposition, discourse models). The goal is to make the students proficient in the relevant terminology, empirical tests and analytical tools, preparing them for reading research papers in these areas of linguistics.
