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Conversational dynamics of Russian questions with 'razve'

This talk is devoted to the conversational dynamics of Russian questions 'razve', a left-periphery particle used in matrix polar with interrogatives with an air of incredulity. 'Razve'-questions can be characterized as conveying negative bias in conflicting-evidence scenarios, thus bearing superficial resemblance to questions with English 'really', Italian 'mica' or German 'etwa'. I will argue that 'razve' in fact instantiates a special type of question bias associated with beliefrevision potential. It signals that the speaker faces an epistemic conflict between prior belief and a current abductive inference. This novel type of bias is not discussed in, or captured by, previous approaches to biased develop an account such that 'razve'-clauses auestions. Ι are interrogatives with a singleton constraint and two epistemic inferences. Taken together, these components (i) explain constraints on the limited syntactic distribution of 'razve' (it only occurs in matrix polar but not declaratives, wh-questions interrogatives. or embedded questions), (ii) easily allow for a biased or a rhetorical interpretation based on context, while (iii) keeping the overall semantics lean. In conclusion. I discuss how aspects of this account can be extended to some cross-linguistic puzzles about biased questions.
