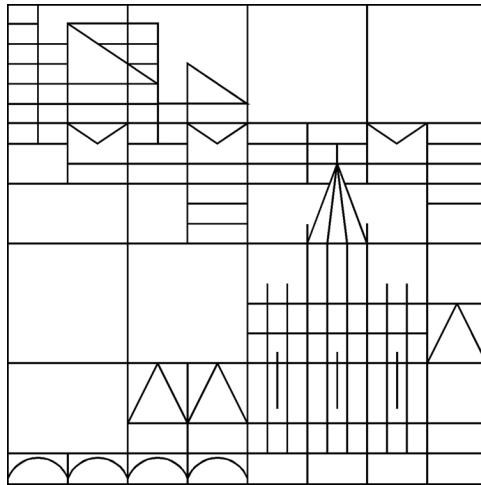

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### I. General Information

Participants in the Master's Programme *Multilingualism* acquire knowledge and skills to deal with many aspects of multilingualism and multilingual acquisition, including linguistic, psycholinguistic, and sociological perspectives. Acquaintance with major scientific findings and their interpretation, relevant analytical skills, and the development of critical thinking play important roles. These competencies are becoming increasingly important in view of our global and multilingual societies. The acquired skills and abilities are relevant for academic work as well as for scientifically informed, responsible, non-academic work. The programme prepares for academic as non-academic careers.

### II. Targeted Qualifications

#### Specialized goals of the Programme

Participants become acquainted with the several phases of language acquisition and the associated terminology, as used from the perspectives of linguistics, sociology and pedagogy. They understand the factors that condition acquisition in various situations, starting from multilingual first-language acquisition, through childhood and adult second-language acquisition, as individual phenomena (e.g., on the psycholinguistic and neuronal level) and as social phenomena (e.g., in processes of language contact, conservation and formation of minority languages).

They become acquainted with current research questions and methods employed in multilingualism research, and they are able to pose original research problems, to obtain and evaluate reliable data, and to interpret these data in the light of current research hypotheses. They can present their knowledge in oral and written forms. In non-academic settings they can apply their knowledge to evaluate practical problems critically and to implement solutions.

#### General goals of the Programme

Working in the specialized field of multilingualism research, participants develop the following, non-specialized skills:

- They can follow presentations of complex material
- They can critically analyse various forms of texts and presentations
- They can present specialized subject matter to non-specialists in an understandable way
- They can construct logically coherent arguments
- They can analyse, manage and visualize complex data

- They can extract the essential points from a complex assemblage of information
- Working independently, they can produce clearly formulated, well-structured and stylistically concise presentations, in oral and written form.

### III. Outline of the Master's Programme in Multilingualism

For the Master's Programme Multilingualism, 120 ECTS<sup>1</sup> credits (cr) must be earned, of which 111 cr shall be obtained in the core areas and 9 cr in the supplementary area (Module 6). A semester abroad or an internship is obligatory in the third semester (Module 5); in cases of hardship, and at the discretion of the department, additional courses amounting to 21 cr from Modules 3, 4 or 6 may be substituted.

<b>Learning Outcomes</b>	Students learn to analyse relevant data from core components of grammar (phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics) and to relate them to linguistic theory. They learn to formulate linguistic hypotheses (derived via inferences and generalizations) and to put them to test.

<b>Module Sections</b>	Ling 321 Quantitative methods/Statistics Ling 322 Experiments and methods in language acquisition research				
<b>Learning Outcomes</b>	Students are introduced to state-of-the art methods in multilingualism research as well as quantitative methods and statistics to analyse linguistic data. They can understand and interpret different kinds of data. They can relate research findings to current linguistic debates and theories.				

<b>Module Section: Ling 321 Quantitative Methods/Statistics</b>	
<b>Lecturer</b>	Bettina Braun, Carsten Eulitz
<b>Content of Teaching</b>	The course provides a basic understanding of behavioural and physiological methods in multilingualism research, designing experiments, collecting and analysing data. A focus will be on data visualization techniques of dependent variables (e.g., bargraphs, scatterplots, and linegraphs with standard deviation or standard error), statistical tools for data analyses (e.g., multinomial and linear regression models, mixed-effects models) and exercises on when to use which.

<b>Content of Teaching</b>	This course covers quantitative, qualitative, and experimental methods in multilingualism and bilingual first, second and third language acquisition research. Students will be introduced to and familiarized with, for example, data elicitation and collection methods, experimental and naturalistic data transcription and analysis, identification of research problems, formulation of hypotheses, validity and reliability in research, and classroom research techniques.

<b>Module Grade</b>	The grade for the module is the arithmetic mean of the grade for each of the two module sections, weighted according to ECTS credits.				
<b>Module Sections</b>	Ling 331 Bilingual first language acquisition/heritage language acquisition Ling 332 Second/third language acquisition Ling 333 Psycholinguistic/neurolinguistic/clinical aspects of multilingualism				
<b>Learning Outcomes</b>	Students will be acquainted with a range of factors that influence the acquisition (i.e. development and ultimate attainment), processing and potential loss of more than one language throughout the life span of an individual. Students explore psycholinguistic aspects as well as the neural processes involved in various acquisition and language processing scenarios. The module gives students the opportunity to examine current research articles and to discuss them critically. Students will be able to present and examine current approaches to bilingual first language acquisition, child and adult second and third language acquisition, heritage language use, code switching and diagnostics for language impairment. In this module students will develop a critical understanding of the key principles that determine the interaction between languages in bi- and multilingual speakers.				

<b>Module Section: Ling 331: Bilingual first language acquisition/heritage language acquisition</b>	
<b>Lecturer</b>	Theodoros Marinis
<b>Content of Teaching</b>	This course discusses literature relevant to the simultaneous and sequential acquisition of more than one language in childhood. It studies in detail theoretical frameworks and empirical studies that explain how children that grow up with two or more languages acquire grammatical knowledge early in life. Students will learn about the traditional and current research related to how humans learn one or two languages during the first years of life and how their two linguistic systems interact.

<b>Module Section: Ling 332: Second/third language acquisition</b>

<b>Content of Teaching</b>	The course will discuss competing models - traditional and current - of language acquisition. We study in detail how monolingual and bilingual speakers acquire an additional language after childhood and how a first or second language influences the acquisition of a second or third language. In this course we will pay special attention to the linguistic, psycholinguistic and social aspects of second and/or third language acquisition in a multilingual context, including the role of cross-linguistic influence and the role of age.

<b>Content of Teaching</b>	This course looks at issues central to the understanding of the complex nature of the multilingual mind and how the multilingual language user represents and processes linguistic information in the brain. Other aspects include the specifics of normal and impaired multilingual language acquisition and attrition.

<b>Module Section</b>	Ling 341 Sociolinguistic and sociological aspects of multilingualism Ling 342 Language contact/language change/language attrition Ling 343 Lecture series on multilingualism				
<b>Learning Outcomes</b>	Students are introduced to phenomena that characterize multilingual societies, e.g. why they emerge and develop, how they change and what their societal consequences can be. They learn the relevant terminology to describe and analyse multilingualism in society (e.g. bilingualism vs. diglossia). They are able to evaluate present situations and foresee potential consequences (e.g., language conflict, language attrition or death).				

<b>Module Section: Ling 341 Sociolinguistic and sociological aspects of multilingualism</b>	
<b>Lecturer</b>	Theodoros Marinis
<b>Content of Teaching</b>	The course discusses literature relevant to sociolinguistic research, focussing on multilingualism. Students will be introduced to and familiarized with data elicitation and collection methods in sociolinguistic research on multilingual societies. They learn how to analyse data by identifying research problems, formulating hypotheses and validating them.

<b>Content of Teaching</b>	This course will be concerned with the potential consequences of multilingualism in societies. We will discuss competing models, trying to explain these consequences for language change, language attrition and language loss. The course is designed to give students the opportunity to tackle research articles, approach them critically, and design and present their own research in a scholarly fashion. Furthermore, they will get to know some of the recent theoretical and practical issues in the field of language contact, language change, language attrition or language loss.

<b>Content of Teaching</b>	The department organises a weekly colloquium series for graduate and doctoral students to present their project proposals and/or their on-going or completed research related to areas in linguistics and multilingualism. Every week one or two students (or an invited speaker) present the background of their project, their research questions, hypotheses, envisaged methodological approach and/or current research findings at the colloquium. The presentations are used to inform graduate and doctoral students as well as faculty members. The research colloquium serves as an example to students on how to present their research projects to colleagues and functions as a forum for sharing ideas, insights and perspectives on multilingualism research.

<b>Module Section: Ling 372: Research seminar</b>	
<b>Lecturer</b>	academic staff
<b>Content of Teaching</b>	The multilingualism research seminar is designed for MA-students with a background in linguistics and multilingualism, as offered in modules 1, 2 and 3. The course focuses on the latest theories and experiments in multilingual research, e.g. in first, second and third language acquisition, language variation, dialectology, educational and the multilingual classroom. Students review linguistic research papers and discuss potential implications for multilingual research and instruction. Students will formulate research questions, discuss methodology and plan their own experiments and/or data collection.
